Intent

At Moorfield Primary School, we are committed to providing a high-quality Art and Design curriculum which engages, inspires and challenges children, equipping them with substantive and disciplinary knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create original pieces of artwork.

Children have the opportunity to explore their ideas and record their experiences, as well as exploring the work of others and evaluate different creative ideas. Children will become confident and proficient in a variety of techniques including drawing, painting, sculpting, as well as other selected craft skills such as collage and printing. Children will also develop their knowledge of notable artists, designers and craft makers. Our curriculum encourages children to develop their interest and curiosity about art and design as well as offering skills and knowledge progression and offering children the opportunity to ask questions and demonstrate their skills in a variety of creative ways.

Implementation

Each key stage focuses on different themes to ensure continued interest in the subject as well as acquiring new knowledge. The progression document ensures a rich and varied Art and Design curriculum is delivered and demonstrates the progression of children's techniques, including their control and their use of materials, with creativity, experimentation and an increasing awareness of different kinds of art, craft and design throughout the school. Children also learn about and express opinions about the works of notable artists, craft makers and designers and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms. This is something which is often explored through the wider curriculum. Sketchbooks are used throughout each key stage to record, review and revisit ideas. Additionally, sketchbooks are used as a form of individual assessment of progression in art and design. Educational visits and workshops provide children with opportunities to explore and develop their skills.

Impact

Our high-quality Art and Design curriculum is centred on demonstrating progression and embedding knowledge and skills.

Children will improve their enquiry skills and inquisitiveness about the world around them, and their impact through art and design on the world. Substantive and disciplinary knowledge and skills will be embedded over time allowing children to produce creative and imaginative pieces of work. Children will become more confident in analysing their work and giving their opinion on their own and other works of art. Children will show competences in improving their resilience and perseverance by continually evaluating and improving their work. All children in school will be able to speak confidently about their art and design work and their skills, using technical vocabulary accurately.

Children have the opportunity to learn from the works of famous artists, studying their techniques and processes. They will be exposed to a range of different artists through history throughout KS1.

Children continue to study the works of famous artists. They have more opportunity to offer opinion and to compare and contrast artists. Children will be exposed to a range of different artists through history, developing their theoretical and disciplinary knowledge by studying their techniques and processes.

Children:

- Learn about the life and work of Claude Monet
- Experiment with mixing colour to recreate colours used in some of Monet's River Thames series of paintings

- Understand the contribution of Claude Monet to art
- Use Monet's Impressionist style as inspiration to create an original piece of artwork
- reflect upon their work inspired by a famous notable artist and the development of their art skills;
- express an opinion on the work of

Children continue to learn from the works of famous artists. They now expand their knowledge by looking at the range of more famous artists. Children comment on the work of famous artists and name their pieces of work.
