Year 2 Newsletter Autumn 2023



Welcome back to another school year!

This newsletter aims to give you an insight into the work that we will be doing over the next term and provides some ideas as to how you can support your child at home. It will also give you a better idea of some of the ways in which we do things in Year 2 so that you and your child feel best prepared for the year ahead.

English

The children will initially continue to be taught in phonics groups using the Read, Write Inc. phonics programme. This programme places a high level of focus on becoming a fluent reader and the children will spend lots of time working on this at school.

Reading



The success of the Read, Write Inc phonics scheme relies in part on the support that your child gets at home to practice their reading skills. Each week the children will bring home a phonetically decodable book – this means that it contains the sounds that they have been taught in school and therefore should be able to read fluently. We are expecting you to read every night with your child and record this in the reading diary. Obviously there will be some

occasions when this is not possible but we would like reading to become a daily habit – much like brushing your teeth! You also have access to an additional book using the online portal. The log in details for this are found in the back of the children's reading diaries. If you have any issuing logging on, please let us know ASAP. The children also bring home a 'book to share' which is a book that you may need to read with them. They are allowed to change this book every morning as they arrive at school. It is really important that the children have reading books and diaries in school every day.



Spelling

Each week the children will bring home a spelling list that will be in their reading diary. This list will be issued on a Monday and the words will follow a spelling pattern. We will look at this spelling pattern in school and also give the children a chance to practice each day. They will have a spelling test on a Friday. Please also remember that in the back of the reading diaries there is a list of common exception words for year 1 and year 2. It would be useful for the children to practice reading and spelling these words also.

Maths

In maths we will start by developing our ability to understand and partition 2-digit numbers. This means that we will be learning to split numbers into tens and ones. We will start by using apparatus and then move on to do this mentally. You can support your child by practising counting in 10's to 100 and by helping them to write numbers to 100 correctly. Later in the term we will also need to be able to count in 2's and 5's. This can easily be practised at home too! We will then move onto using our knowledge of place value to add and subtract 2-digit numbers using apparatus and then a



written method. Towards the end of the term, we will look at shape. It would be great if you could help your child to recall the names of 2D and 3D shapes in preparation for this work.

Homework

We are going to start using an online programme called Century. This has been used in KS2 for the past year and has proved successful. The children will need a log in to access the work that I will set each week and I will receive feedback as to how they have got on. The programme adjusts the work set based on how confident the children are at each task. For this reason, it is best that you allow the children to work with a high level of independence, otherwise they might be set work that is too hard for them. We will show the children how to log on in the classroom and will let you know when Century will begin. I am hoping that it will be in the next few weeks.

<u>P.E</u>

Children in year 2 do PE on a Monday, Tuesday and a Wednesday. It makes more sense for them to come home in their kits and bring their uniform home in their PE bag. Their kit can then be washed and returned to school the following Monday.

Water Bottles and other possessions.

Please make sure that the children have a water bottle in school each day. We try to discourage the children from bringing in toys and trinkets as they often get lost or broken. As the children are getting a bit older, we do not really do show and tell in year 2. We are however starting a 'book club' where we would like children to bring in special books each week to share with the rest of the class. We will produce a timetable

for this so that you know when it is your child's turn. Hopefully everyone will get a go every term.
